Commission of Inquiry into Forensic DNA Testing in Queensland

STATEMENT OF DALE FRIEBERG

I, **Dale Frieberg**, of 200 Roma Street, Brisbane, Queensland, 4001 state as follows:

The following statement is provided in response to a notice I received from the Commission of Inquiry into Forensic DNA Testing in Queensland requiring me to give information in a written statement regarding my knowledge of matters set out in the Schedule attached to that notice. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 1' is a copy of that notice.

Current Employment

1. I am the Superintendent (Commander), Integrity and Performance Group, Ethical Standards Command.

Qualifications and experience

- 2. My qualifications include:-.

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- 3. A copy of my CV is attached and marked 'Exhibit 2'.
- 4. For the period August 2017 to September 2018, I was the Superintendent of the Forensic Services Group (FSG). I reported to the Assistant Commissioner Operations Support Command who at the time was Assistant Commissioner Michael Condon. After Michael Condon transferred in the latter part of 2018, I reported to Assistant Commissioner Alan McCarthy. Both Assistant Commissioners are now retired from the QPS. During these periods, Chief Superintendent Steve Dabinett would act from time to time in the Assistant Commissioner's role while the substantive was away. I reported to Acting Assistant Commissioner David French during 2021/2022. The substantive, Shane Chelepy, was involved in the QPS response to COVID.
- 5. Those that reported to me included:
 - a) My support officer Sergeant Karen Heit (2017/2018 and 2021/2022);
 - b) Coronial Support Unit Detective Inspector Simon Palmer (2017/2018) /
 Detective Inspector Larissa Miller (2021/2022);
 - c) Forensic Technology Unit– Acting Inspector Troy O'Malley (2017/2018);
 - d) Fingerprint Bureau–Inspector Brendan Keleher (now retired) (2017/2018);
 - e) DNA Management Unit–Inspector Phil Stevens then Acting Inspector Ewen Taylor, and then Inspector Dave Neville (2017/2018). On my return to FSG in 2021/2022, the Fingerprint Bureau and DNA Management had been combined to form the Biometrics Unit Inspector Dave Neville;
 - f) Scientific Section Inspector Darren Pobar;
 - g) Quality Management Section –Inspector Dave Keatinge (2017);
 - h) Photographic and Electronic Recording Section (Now Forensic Imaging Section) –Inspector Adrian Freeman (2017) and Inspector Phil Stevens (2018). On my return in 2021/2022 Inspector Gai Bolderow was in charge of the area;

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- i) Forensic Manager for Central Region Inspector Artie VanPanhuis. In 2021/2022 this position was relieved by Acting Inspector Tania Spiteri for the majority of my time back at the FSG in 2021/2022;
- j) Forensic Manager for Southeast Region Acting Inspector Ken Koplick and then Acting Inspector Donna Stewart (2017/2018). On my return in 2021/2022, Inspector Duncan McCarthy was the substantive Inspector;
- k) Forensic Manager for South Brisbane -Inspector Paul Baker. On my return in 2021/2022, there were a number of relieving members in the Acting Inspector role including Peter Bushell and Andrew Stanley;
- Forensic Manager for North Brisbane/Sunshine Coast –Inspector Keatinge (2017/2018) followed by Inspector Adrian Freeman (until 2021prior to my return to the FSG). During 2021/2022, Acting Inspector Pip Kemp performed the role at North Brisbane and Sunshine Coast Regions; and
- Forensic Manager for Northern and Far Northern region Inspector Don McKay (2017) who is located in Cairns and travels as required to Townsville
 / Mt. Isa and other areas located in the Northern and Far Northern Regions.
- 6. My general responsibilities included:
 - a) Provide leadership to the Forensic Services Group and its membership;
 - b) Manage the strategic and operational risks, opportunities and response of forensics in support of investigative functions of the QPS;
 - c) Manage the diverse range of forensic services to support frontline police to investigate, solve and stop crime; and
 - d) Represent QPS Forensic Services / participate in national forums and committees to benchmark forensic standards and practices.



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- 7. In addition to my general duties, I am also required to liaise with various stakeholders in regard to:
 - a) Disaster investigations requiring QPS DVI (Disaster Victim Identification) whereby I undertake a role as the Commander and chief scientific officer;
 - b) Human Resources and Financial responsibilities under the *Financial Accountability Act 2009*; and
 - c) Reporting obligations to Executive Management of the QPS.
- 8. I officially commenced in the role with the FSG on Monday, 7 August 2017.
- 9. In the week prior to this, I liaised with Acting Superintendent Scott McLaren who provided me with a Handover Briefing Document in relation to the DNA Management Section and Quality Management Section. I do not have any specific notes in my official diary or elsewhere of that handover process. A copy of that Handover Briefing Document is attached and marked 'Exhibit 3".
- 10. At the conclusion of my relieving period in 2018, I liaised with Superintendent Bruce McNab and provided him with a Handover Briefing Document. I do not have any specific notes in my official diary or elsewhere of that handover process.
- 11. On 5 October 2021, and upon entering the Superintendent position in the FSG, I liaised with Inspector Duncan McCarthy who had been relieving in the Superintendent's role and provided me with a Handover Briefing Document During that briefing, I made notes on the Handover Briefing Note provided to me by Inspector Duncan McCarthy. I do not recall and have not been able to locate any other notes, emails or other documents related to that handover. A copy of that Handover Briefing Document attached and marked 'Exhibit 4'.
- 12. On 22 February 2022, I liaised with Superintendent Bruce McNab via telephone and provided him with a briefing on the FSG. I do not recall and have not been able to locate any other notes, emails or other documents related to that handover. A copy of the



- typed notes I referred to for the handover to Superintendent Bruce McNab are attached and marked 'Exhibit 5'.
- 13. During my conversation with Superintendent Bruce McNab on 22 February 2022, I don't recall making any comment regarding turnaround times for DNA. However, I do recall speaking with him regarding the SAIK (Sexual Assault Investigation Kit) working group the Executive Briefing Note (EBN) I submitted to the Executive and issues with Dr Griffin of Queensland Health. A copy of that EBN is attached and marked "Exhibit 6".
- 14. During 2017 and 2018, there were over 500 members in the FSG including 13 people who reported directly to me in my position as the Superintendent of the FSG being 12 Inspectors and 1 Sergeant support officer. The structure of the FSG did not change during that period, with the exception of the Forensic Technology Unit following the resignation of Troy O'Malley in 2018. A chart of the organisational structure of the FSG for the period 2017 to 2018 is attached and marked 'Exhibit 7".
- 15. There were no specific changes to the role of Superintendent of the FSG between the time I relieved in 2017/2018 and my return in 2021/2022. There were, however, changes to the structure of the group with the inclusion of additional units due to service re-alignment, along with some changes in the staff and boundaries. An additional position answered to the Superintendent at the time of my arrival in 2021/2022. This was a Project Officer who directly reported to the Superintendent (Senior Sergeant Simone Quig).

Backlogs

I believe there were reported backlogs at the time I took over as Superintendent of the FSG in each of 2017 and 2021 and also from time to time while I was in the role of Superintendent of the FSG during the periods 2017 to 2018 and 2021 to 2022. I cannot recall the specific details of conversations if any that I had with QHFSS, however, I recall the backlog at one stage reached 60 days, as compared with a 10-day turnaround time.



- 17. I recall Inspector Dave Neville as the person who reported on the backlogs and challenged the turnaround times with Queensland Health Forensic and Scientific Services (QHFSS). I don't recall this being raised by any other officer performing the Inspector's role in DNA however it is possible that those performing Inspector or Officer in Charge duties may well have raised issues directly with QHFSS.
- 18. From time-to-time Inspector Dave Neville emailed me regarding DNA turnaround times, thresholds for testing and DNA sample triaging. I also recall conversations between myself and Inspector Neville over the duration of my tenure at FSG. I do not recall the specifics of each of the conversations, but I had confidence in Inspector Dave Neville to manage the turnaround times as part of his responsibilities as the Officer in Charge of the DNA Unit.
- 19. On my return to the Superintendent position in 2021/2022, I recall discussions regarding the current status of DNA testing and turnaround times, with Inspector Dave Neville raising concerns in relation to turnaround times and the thresholds for testing. I raised the issue with the Assistant Commissioner and an Executive Briefing Note (EBN) was prepared and submitted to the Acting Assistant Commissioner in February of 2022. A copy of that EBN is attached and marked 'Exhibit 8'.
- 20. On the 18th of November 2021, I attended a meeting with Lara Keller (Acting Executive Director for QHFSS), Justin Howes (Acting Manager for QHFSS), Inspector Dave Neville and myself to discuss various issues including the DNA testing turnaround times. During that briefing, I made notes the following notes at pages 184 to 185 official diary K24470 which states:

QHFSS and QPS meeting – present ED Keller / Acting Manager QHFSS Justin Howes, Inspector Dave Neville and self – discussed current status of DNA testing and turnaround times / status of Forensic Register testing and expected enhancements, illicit drugs and other items. There was an appreciation for the stats and the turnaround times with QH recognising there was some room for improvement. Discussed they had some priority jobs (Blackburn) – agreement that Inspector Neville



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would email stats to QH at the beginning of each week and that they would continue to monitor to improve.

A copy of pages 184 to 185 of my official diary (K24470) are attached and marked 'Exhibit 9'.

Communication between the FSG and QHFSS

- 21. During my handover period with Acting Superintendent McLaren in 2017, I met with QHFSS staff at Coopers Plains. From my recollection Cathie Allen, Paul Csoban and Acting Superintendent McLaren were present. The purpose of the meeting was to introduce me. Regular meetings occurred during my period with the FSG in 2017/2018 (possibly on a monthly basis). There were also emails between QPS members and QHFSS staff, often Cathie Allen and primarily with DNA / Forensic Register Staff.
- 22. On my return to the FSG in 2021, Cathie Allen contacted me with a view to reestablishing the regular meetings.
- 23. The meetings with QHFSS were, at times, held in person during my time at the FSG in 2017/2018. On my return in 2021/2022 meetings were generally conducted using Microsoft Teams and not in person. The Acting Executive Director (ED), Lara Keller, was also involved in those meetings.
- 24. The meetings were generally held to discuss matters either QHFSS or QPS needed to raise such as the Forensic Register; DNA; SAIKs; Procedures regarding QPS members attending autopsies; bar code changes and implications for the Forensic Register requiring updating; and DNA testing kits.
- 25. I can recall two meetings relating to SAIKs during my time as Superintendent in 2021/2022. This related to the non-compliance of QHFSS with the guidelines for taking of reference samples and to discuss training and expansion of locations where samples could be taken. Minutes were taken on both occasions, with the 2nd meeting recorded electronically.



- 26. I personally did not experience any communication problems with QHFSS staff and on my return in 2021/2022. I found the Acting ED, Lara Keller easy to communicate with. In my view, she appeared to work to ensure there was good communication and relationship between the two agencies.
- 27. The communication between QHFSS and QPS was professional and ongoing. In 2022 Acting ED Keller indicated to be me that she found Inspector Dave Neville to be very professional. In saying that, it appeared to me there was an obvious rub in personalities between Inspector Dave Neville and Cathie Allen. I am not aware of the history behind this however, I recall Cathie Allen was disappointed when Inspector Dave Neville was appointed to the DNA portfolio.
- 28. I cannot recall any specific steps taken by myself to improve communication between QPS and QHFSS, nor did I feel a need too. Communication between the parties occurred through meetings and conversations or by responding to emails, as required. I was of the view that, whilst there was a personality rub, Inspector Dave Neville was proactive in performing his role and challenging issues with QHFSS where necessary.
- 29. My relationship with Cathie Allen during each period I worked as Superintendent of the FSG was always professional.

The Forensic Register

- 30. The Forensic Register (FR) is an information management system that was built inhouse within the FSG (by Troy O'Malley when he was employed by the QPS). QPS entered into a managed service arrangement (MOU) with QHFSS with respect to their access and use of the FR. I had no involvement in discussions regarding the managed service arrangement as this was already in place on my arrival in 2017/2018.
- 31. On my return in 2021/2022, new contractual arrangements regarding the FR were in place. I was involved in regular monthly meetings between the FSG and BDNA who are a technology systems integrator and business advisory consultancy. These meetings did not require QHFSS to be present. Superintendent Bruce McNab navigated the current arrangements.




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- 32. The only issues brought to my attention in relation to the FR were in relation to succession planning and protection of the coding of the FR. When Troy O'Malley resigned from the QPS in 2018 and moved to BDNA, the QPS had to engage BDNA to provide ongoing support as they were now the only provider with expertise in the functions and capabilities of the FR.
- 33. Prior to his resignation, Troy O'Malley was the Acting Inspector in charge of the Forensic Technology Unit. He had been relieving in that role for 8 years continuously. He was the Forensic Register as a result of it being his design and him being the primary administrator over a long period of time.

The Options Paper

- I first became aware of the report entitled, 'A review of the automatic concentration of DNA extracts using Microcon Centrifugal Filter Devices: Options for QPS consideration (January 2018)' (the Options Paper) via an email from Cathie Allen. In that email she stated that she and Paul Csoban were going to discuss it as an agenda item at a set meeting between QHFSS and QPS in 2018. I cannot recall any discussions with QHFSS surrounding the Options Paper prior to 30 January 2018. On receipt of the Options Paper, I forwarded it to the Acting Inspector of the QPS DNA Management Unit, Ewen Taylor, requesting advice. A copy of correspondence regarding the Options Paper is attached and marked 'Exhibit 10'.
- 35. On 2 February 2018, I recall having a meeting with QFHSS to discuss the Options Paper. Whilst I cannot specifically recall this meeting, I made notes of it at pages 54 to 56 of my official diary K20405. A copy of my diary entry is attached and marked 'Exhibit 11'.
- 36. After the meeting with QHFSS on 2 February 2018, I sent an email to Cathie Allen and others confirming my understanding of the issues and my position in regard to them. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 12' is a copy of an email dated 2 February 2018 regarding the Options Paper.



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- 37. I cannot recall any further conversation relating to the Options Paper other than what was recorded in my diary notes or emails.
- 38. On advice of the subject matter experts, QHFSS, whom QPS pay \$3M a year for advice and guidance in best practice, in addition to Acting Inspector Taylor, I accepted Option 2 of the Options Paper.
- 39. I am not a scientist and relied on and trusted advice provided by the subject matter experts. I acted on the advice believing it was the best option at the time. My understanding was that the option would be of benefit to the QPS, being more productive as well as being a more efficient choice. I was also under the impression that DNA staff could continue to request additional processing as it was received by investigators, therefore did not anticipate an impact on DNA testing results. As a result of the choice, I was also under the impression it would provide the opportunity to concentrate on samples yielding more DNA to assist in the solvability of cases.
- 40. I cannot recall if the changes proposed by the Options Paper were put into practice.
- 41. I cannot recall whether there was any internal QPS communication surrounding the implementation of the Options Paper.
- 42. At the time of accepting Option 2, I was of the opinion that the selection made would enable QHFSS to provide the best service for the QPS. However, based on subsequent advice from, and conversations with, Inspector Neville and having regard to the approaches he has made to QHFSS over time, it appears that there may be DNA that would yield results should the testing thresholds be revisited and changed.

Olivia McIntyre

- 43. Olivia is a staff member who works in the DNA unit. I am not aware of the role she performs or what her responsibilities are.
- 44. I have no knowledge of any involvement Olivia may have had in 2018 or beyond as it relates to the Options Paper.



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45. In relation to the investigation, I became aware of the news coverage and podcast series through Inspector Dave Neville. Inspector Dave Neville notified me of an email trail on 25 November 2021 regarding concerns raised by a former QHFSS employee involved in a podcast series called "Story". On 25 November 2021, I forwarded the email to Acting Assistant Commissioner David French. I also forwarded some suggested dot points for a Possible Parliamentary Question (PPQ) prepared by Inspector Dave Neville to Assistant Commissioner David French's office. I understand Inspector Dave Neville discussed the dot points with the Acting ED of QHFSS, Lara Keller, as a courtesy. A copy of my email set on 25 November 2021 to Assistant Commissioner David French and the dot points prepared by Inspector Dave Neville are attached and marked 'Exhibit 13'.


46. On 29 November 2021, I received an email from Inspector Neville following a conversation he had with Superintendent Craig Morrow of the Homicide Investigation Group regarding the findings of Dr Kristy Wright. On 2 December 2021, I forwarded this email to Acting Assistant Commissioner David French and also advised him about the ongoing media coverage around . The email discussed a number of issues. It recorded the fact that Inspector Neville had raised an issue in relation to another murder, that of , which had some similarity to the investigation in so far as DNA samples provided to QHFSS were deemed to be DNA insufficient and on further testing had yielded results. The email also recorded a concern raised by Inspector Neville that Cathie Allen had suggested it was incumbent on the QPS to prioritise testing and monitor results and request reworks when a sample yielded an unusual result. In the email I raised the concern that police are not DNA experts and would not have the knowledge of the likelihood of a particular sample yielding a profile based on a quantification threshold; this relied on the expert advice of the scientist who had provided advice previously there was insufficient DNA to get a result. At the conclusion of my email, I advised the Assistant Commissioner that Inspector Neville had queried whether there needed to be a review of the threshold



- value, to which Cathie Allen had indicated there was no need as they had ample data to support their processes. A copy of the email is attached and marked 'Exhibit 14'.
- 47. On 2 December 2021, Detective Inspector Larissa Miller (Coronial Support) forwarded an email to me regarding the coronial inquest, which I forwarded to the Acting Assistant Commissioner. The Acting Assistant Commissioner later acknowledged receipt of my earlier email of 2 December 2021 and noted that the inquest was to be re-opened. Those emails are attached and marked 'Exhibit 15'.
- 48. On 6 December 2021, ED Keller and I were included in an email to Cathie Allen which followed up on Inspector Neville's previous inquiries. That email also advised Cathie Allen that Coroner O'Connell had scheduled a meeting with Investigators, which QHFSS were not aware of or privy to. A copy of email trails with Cathie Allen relating to this issue and dated 6 December 2021 are attached and marked 'Exhibit 16'.
- 49. On 6 December 2021, Cathie Allen emailed me and proposed a Peer Review of the Forensic DNA Analysis casefile. ED Keller and Inspector Neville were included in the email. I raised issues regarding QHFSS releasing case information without the consent of QPS as there had been no consultation regarding the approach. A copy of my email to Acting Assistant Commissioner French is attached and marked 'Exhibit 17'.
- 50. On 7 December 2021, I sent an email to Cathie Allen advising that, as a result of the brief to the coroner being scheduled for the following day, QHFSS were not to send the file for peer review. A copy of the email incorporating my response to Cathie Allen dated 7 December 2021 is attached and marked 'Exhibit 18'.
- 51. I recall that during this time, Inspector Neville additionally also raised concerns with me over information being released by QH on an RTI request without consultation.
- 52. On 9 December 2021, I emailed ED Keller and then called her personally to advise that the coroner had instructed that he did not support QH conducting a peer review and that it was not to occur. I left ED Keller to advise Cathie Allen. A copy of that email is attached and marked 'Exhibit 19'.



- 53. At my request dot points were forwarded from the Forensic Manager Central Region to the Assistant Commissioner's office to provide a comprehensive brief of the meeting with the coroner. A copy of that email is attached and marked 'Exhibit 20'.
- 54. On 14 December 2021, I received a request for Dr Matt Krosch to provide some background information to Dr Kirsty Wright regarding research he had conducted (his research was at that time released and available publicly). I believe Dr Krosch responded to the request. A copy of the emails relating to this matter are attached and marked 'Exhibit 21'.
- 55. Inspector Dave Neville shared the email information with Cathie Allen and ED Keller as a courtesy. Cathie Allen provided a response via email. A copy of the email from Cathie Allen is attached and marked 'Exhibit 22'.
- On 20 December 2021, I was copied on an email from Cathie Allen to Inspector Dave Neville regarding an article that appeared in The Australian on 19 December 2021. A copy of that email, together with further emails between Inspector Neville and Cathie Allen the following date, are attached and marked 'Exhibit 23'.
- On 22 February 2022, an EBN regarding QHFSS and DNA sample triaging, along with a draft letter under the hand of the Commissioner of Police to the Director-General at Queensland Health was sent to my office (authored by Inspector Dave Neville). The content of the briefing note was supported and submitted to the Assistant Commissioner's office. I am not aware as to what occurred following this as I finished with FSG shortly after. A copy of that EBN is referred to at paragraph [19] above and attached as **Exhibit 8.** A copy of the draft letter under the hand of the Commissioner of Police to the Director General of Queensland Health (dated 25 July 2022) is attached and marked as '**Exhibit 24**". I note that the date of 25 July 2022 would be an automated date generated by the computer and would not have been the real date on which this document was drafted because our usual practice is to leave the date blank.

60.	I do not recall having any communication within the FSG or with QHFSS regarding this operation.

61.	I became aware of the investigation into the death after receiving two emails, one from Tania Spiteri dated 26 November 2021 and an email dated Monday 29 November 2021 from Inspector Dave Neville. A copy of these emails are attached and marked 'Exhibit 25'.
62.	I received another email from Inspector Dave Neville dated 6 December 2021, where DNA testing thresholds were addressed by him. This formed part of the EBN that was submitted to the Assistant Commissioner in February 2022. A copy of the email by Inspector Dave Neville and attached email trail is attached and marked 'Exhibit 26'.
63.	The Acting Assistant Commissioner advised me to raise it as a customer service issue, with QHFSS, in first instance. I conveyed that advice to Inspector Dave Neville to approach accordingly.
64.	I believe Inspector Neville raised the issue with Cathie Allen, as requested, and later an Executive Briefing Note was prepared for submission to the Assistant Commissioner. A copy of the email trail with Cathie Allen is attached and marked 'Exhibit 27'.
65.	A summary was provided as part of the weekly brief to the Assistant Commissioner's office regarding the and matters. A copy of this summary is attached and marked 'Exhibit 28'.
66.	I do not recall any further involvement in this matter.

Forensic Medical Examinations

- A Sexual Assault Investigation Kit (SAIK) is used in the examination of a victim who has been subject to a sexual assault (Rape). Two samples are taken from a victim exposing the victim to two separate forensic procedures. The first procedure is conducted in order to take samples (for evidentiary purposes) from the victim using the SAIK. The second, 'a reference sample' is a procedure that occurs later, where a DNA reference sample (usually a mouth swab and on occasion a blood sample) is taken from the victim. The reference sample is completed several days or even a week following the first procedure and is (currently) taken by a police officer.
- 68. On my return to the FSG in October 2021 I received an email from Inspector Gai Bolderow dated 8 October 2021 titled, "Issues experienced with Sexual Assault Forensic Procedures". It discussed ongoing issues that the Child Abuse and Sexual Crime Group were having with QH regarding the provision of forensic examinations of sexual assault victims by Hospital and Health Services. The email was authored by Detective Inspector Dave Briese and highlighted the non-compliance with the Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines (the Guideline) of 2014 (a document signed by the Chief Executive Officer of each of QPS, QH, DJAG and the Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services). A copy of the email by Inspector Gai Bolderow dated 8 October 2021 is attached and marked 'Exhibit 29'.
- 69. Inspector Peter Bushell of Forensic Services forwarded an email to me on 11 October 2021 outlining the issues around reference samples which are taken as part of the forensic medical examination. A copy of the email by Inspector Peter Bushell is attached and marked 'Exhibit 30'.
- 70. Following the emails, I met with Inspector Bushell and Inspector Dave Briese in person and on the phone to discuss the issues further from a victim-centric perspective.
- 71. On 17 November 2021, a discussion in relation to SAIK issues occurred with Inspectors Dave Neville and Peter Bushell and ED Keller. The conversation concerned who needed to be involved. The parties previously engaged in conversations were identified as being Dr Adam Griffin / Dr Keith McNeil. It was agreed to meet in 1 weeks' time,



with my office to set a meeting. I advised ED Keller that we were in the process of escalating the issues up through our chain of command. ED Keller seemed supportive of compliance with the Guideline. It was noted that Dr Griffin reports to her and that Cathie Allen was currently on Recreation Leave. A copy of my diary (page 188 of diary K24470) regarding my notes of this conversation is attached and marked 'Exhibit 31'.

- On Thursday 18 November 2021, there was a further discussion with Acting Assistant Commissioner Dave French and Assistant Commissioner Kath Innes regarding concerns around SAIKs and non-compliance with the Guideline. Present also was myself and Inspectors Dave Briese, Peter Bushell and Dave Neville. The Assistant Commissioners were invited to attend a meeting with ED Keller. It was determined that an MBN would be provided as reference material prior to meeting. It was also suggested that a working group form and that there be an agency meeting between QH and QPS. A copy of my notes of this conversation (page 202 of diary K24470) are attached and marked 'Exhibit 32'.
- 73. On 24 November 2021, I sent an email to Assistant Commissioner Kath Innes briefing her as to the issues to be raised in the meeting later that morning with ED Lara Keller. A copy of my email to Assistant Commissioner Kath Innes and Inspector Dave Briese enclosing the MBN is attached and marked 'Exhibit 33'.
- 74. A copy of my diary (page 215 of diary K24470) regarding additional preparation / consideration notes for the briefing document and working group agenda on SAIKs is attached and marked 'Exhibit 34'.
- 75. Two working group meetings occurred between QHFSS and QPS. The 1st was held on Tuesday, 7 December 2021. Those present at the meeting which was held via teams is outlined on the agenda. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 35' is a copy of the agenda and minutes from this meeting.
- 76. On distribution of the minutes, there was some contention around the contents. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 36' is a copy of relevant emails relating to this issue as well as notes from my official diary K24470 at pages 273 to 278.



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- 77. As a result of the comments made regarding the minutes from the 7th of December meeting, I made the decision that any future working group meetings would be electronically recorded for accuracy.
- 78. Dr Griffin and Detective Inspector Dave Briese had met on a number of occasions. I was not privy to those meetings, but I understand that there were discussions around SAIKs and OH locations.
- 79. Dr Griffin is the Director and Senior Forensic Physician of the Clinical Forensic Medical Unit (CFMU) at Queensland Health. I had not met Dr Griffin prior to the meeting on the 15th of December 2021.
- 80. Dr Griffin was an apology for the 1st Working Group meeting. He attended the second Working Group meeting which was held on the 15th of December 2021 over Microsoft Teams. I found him to be difficult and belligerent. As a result, it seemed apparent to me that the working group was not going to progress, so I interjected and terminated the meeting early. Dr Griffin did not appear interested in progressing issues. He made comment that there was a typographical error in the guideline document which, if it had been corrected, would remove their (Queensland Health medical staff) responsibility from being involved in the taking of reference samples. He also stated that he did not have confidence in his Medical Doctors to take a reference sample. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 37' is a copy of this meeting agenda and transcript.
- 81. The following day or so, ED Lara Keller reached out to me and Inspector Dave Neville for a meeting to move forward with the issues and the working group. She indicated she would keep the working group at practitioner level. I do not recall whether ED Lara Keller reached out to me via email or telephone or some other method but do recall that Dave Neville alerted me to the fact and the meeting was set.
- 82. A briefing was then provided by me to both Acting Assistant Commissioner David French and Assistant Commissioner Kath Innes.



As a result of the apparent difficulties in progressing issues of non-compliance with the guidelines by QH out of the working group (meeting on 15 December 2021), an EBN was compiled and submitted. It was progressed to Deputy Commissioner Tracy Linford who was a committee member of the Women's Safety Justice Taskforce. I was later advised by Assistant Commissioner Kath Innes that matters had been progressed to the Commissioner. I do not recall if there were any other issues regarding forensic medical examinations during my time with the FSG.

Other issues

- 84. I am aware that, at the time I commenced as Superintendent of the FSG in 2017, there were some issues around the PowerPlex 21 kit (PP21), namely amplification issues which affected the results. The turnaround times also increased. Cathie Allen forwarded an email to this effect in April of 2018. It appeared to be a manufacturing issue with new kits provided by the manufacturer, however the issue continued. It appeared from advice from QHFSS that other jurisdictions experienced similar issues which confirmed the issues were kit-based rather than an issue within QHFSS. During this issue, Cathie Allen provided regular updates to the QPS with a view to resolve the issues. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 38' are copies of relevant emails pertaining to this issue.
- 85. Other than the issues already identified, I recall Inspector Neville identified an issue regarding the rate of DNA sampling being undertaken by QPS officers. That is arresting officers were not collecting DNA samples from offenders as often as they could have been. This may have had flow on impacts on crime clear up rates. The issues were raised to Executive Level with the issue communicated to District Officers and Regional Assistant Commissioners.
- 86. I cannot recall whether there were any changes in policy or processes about, or the training related to, DNA collection, transportation or storage during my time in the FSG.



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- 87. During my time in the FSG I recall that issues were raised by QHFSS during the 2021 SAIK working group meetings as it related to reference samples and packaging of same / concerns of contamination. These were captured in the relevant minutes as provided.
- 88. I recall Inspector Dave Neville having a conversation with me regarding the retraction or changing of DNA results by QFHSS however I cannot recall if this was during my time as the Superintendent or while Superintendent McNab was in the role. While I cannot recall the specifics on the conversation, I do recall him indicating that Queensland Health had on more than one occasion withdrawn their previous position on DNA findings. Attached and marked 'Exhibit 39' is a copy of an email sent to me by Inspector Dave Neville in September 2018 regarding the recall of results by QHFSS.
- 89. From a policing perspective, the consequence of retracting results could compromise the outcome of an investigation or prosecution as well as potentially jeopardise current and historic cases. The consequences could also include loss of confidence of the community and government.

Example: In driving accountability and outcomes I identified gaps in success of CALD recruits with high rate of failure in driver training skills leading to higher than normal percentage being placed in a 'Show Cause' situation and at jeopardy of losing their employment contract and status as Police Recruit with the QPS. A number of examples of newly sworn first year constables with the CALD background had also been highlighted in regions as a result of near accidents whilst on duty contributed to lack of attention and compliance with the road rules. Identified possible causal issue being the varied licensing standards and governance in attaining driver licenses between countries in contrary to standards of driving skill expected by Qld Department of Transport of Australian nationals as opposed to immigrants to the country (recruits not having basic driving skills). Due to the possible risk and liability to the QPS and other government agencies, I identified and initiated an interdepartmental working group to be chaired by the Inspector Operational Skills with key stakeholders including the OIC of Driver Training, Inspector Recruiting, Multicultural Society, Department of Transport, Immigration and other

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government/non-government agencies to identify key issues with a view producing some tangible outcomes to lower risk and keep the community safe. Committee recently formed, and work is ongoing.

Overview of the area, including responsibilities and portfolios:

The DNA Management Section operates within Forensic Services Group under Operations Support Command and is responsible for the efficient and effective coordination and management of DNA services for the Queensland Police Service and other agencies.

Its individual unit's primary role is the management and quality assurance of DNA person and crime scene information and links obtained from searching on the National Criminal Investigation DNA Database (NCIDD) and with the management retention and destruction of DNA profiles. This profile management is conducted within a strict legislative framework.

DMS also liaises closely with other national and international jurisdictions as well as Queensland Health and Forensic Scientific Services (QHFSS) who are at present our sole service provider providing DNA analytical services for the Queensland Police Service.

Work Units:

The DNA Management Section is divided into 3 work units and a number of work teams:

- DNA Sample Management Unit
- o Person Sampling Team
- o Liaison Team
- DNA Results Management Unit
- o Results Management Team
- o Interstate Liaison Team
- DNA Quality & Administration Office

- o Quality Assurance Manager
- o Profile Management Team

Sample Management Unit

The Sample Management Unit is often the first point of contact for most police and acts as a liaison between the QPS and QH. The main role of the unit is the receipt and QA of all DNA person samples to be submitted to QH for analysis and uploading to NCIDD. This QA is largely to ensure that each sample has been taken as per legislation. This unit also manages the court requests for DNA evidence between the QPS and QH.

The Liaison Team provides a liaison between the investigators and the Queensland Health case scientists in relation to crime scene exhibits. This team overviews the submission and prioritisation of crime scene exhibits from around the state and acts as the point of inquiry for both police and QH staff in relation to turn around times and court requirements.

Results Management Unit

The Results Management Unit (Result Management Team) is responsible for the receipt, collation and quality assurance of DNA match results. The unit ensures the legality of the QPS records and accuracy of the information transferred by QH before facilitating the timely dissemination of those results into QPRIME and investigators.

Profile Management Team

The Profile Management Team manages the profile retention, interstate DNA links, requests and inquiries between Queensland and other jurisdictional DNA databases through NCIDD and direct requests. The Interstate Liaison Team is a role that is performed by staff from the Results Management Team and Profile Management Team also manages the DNA links and inquiries between Queensland and other jurisdictional DNA databases through NCIDD and direct requests. This role includes:

- Liaising with Service personnel and interstate jurisdictions in relation to the dissemination of DNA results.
- Monitor, administer, review and develop quality assurance procedures and associated policies related to the sharing of DNA results with other jurisdictions.
- Manage DNA and forensic information received from other jurisdictions and provide appropriate responses or add information to the Forensics Register for release on QPRIME.


The Unit (Profile Management Team) is also responsible for the processes surrounding the retention or destruction of DNA profiles in line with QPS legislative requirements.

Quality Assurance:

PMU work in a role that consists of supplying ongoing advice in relation to all matters relating to the recording on Qprime of the taking and processing of DNA samples. The knowledge required in PMU is to be able to identify how errors have occurred and an in-depth knowledge of the Ident/Fingerprint page on Qprime. Advice is given to all areas of policing including IU Investigations and external stake holders including individuals and legal practices representing clients. Training is constant with staff and not only individuals are trained on the different levels of Quality Assurance, but also group training when new matters are identified or advice supplied from the Police Solicitor



EXECUTIVE BRIEFING NOTE

SUBJECT: NON-COMPLIANCE OF 2014 QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT INTERAGENCY GUIDELINES – RESPONSE TO PEOPLE WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED SEXUAL ASSAULT

PURPOSE:

 To ensure the Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines for Responding to People who have Experienced Sexual Assault are adhered to by all responsible agencies to ensure an efficient victim centric approach is adopted in line with the "Prevent, Support, Believe – Queensland Framework to Address Sexual Violence", when obtaining reference DNA samples for analysis of sexual assault investigation kits.

BACKGROUND:

- 2. In June 2014 a Government Interagency Working Group published the policy document Response to Sexual Assault Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines for Responding to People who have Experienced Sexual Assault (cosigned by CEO's of QPS, QH, DJAG and the Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services copy attached). The purpose of the Guideline was to prevent unnecessary trauma being caused to the victims including during subsequent forensic medical examinations. It recommends that victim DNA reference samples, usually a mouth swab (on occasion a blood sample) should be taken routinely as part of the forensic medical examination.
- 3. Currently in Queensland, victims are subjected to two separate forensic procedures which is contrary to the guidelines. They are first subject to a forensic medical examination conducted by trained doctors and nurses, where samples are collected using a Sexual Assault Investigation Kit (SAIK). This is followed by a later procedure where a DNA reference sample is taken at the direction of a police officer. The second procedure is often completed several days or even a week following the first.
- 4. The collection of DNA by police can increase stress for the victims at a time they are most vulnerable due to fear of how the information may be used by authorities. Queensland is the only Australian jurisdiction where police are involved in the collection of reference samples. In all other jurisdictions the reference sample is taken as part of the forensic medical examination as recommended in the Guideline. This ensures that the victim is subject to only one invasive procedure, thereby minimising trauma.
- Since the Guideline was published, the QPS has been liaising with Queensland Health to have the process altered so that it is consistent with the national best practice and aligns with the standing guidelines. All requests to implement change

have been declined by Dr Adam Griffin who manages the forensic medical program within Queensland Health.

- 6. Enquiries have been conducted with all Australian jurisdictions which identified that Queensland and Western Australia are the only jurisdictions where the reference sample was taken by the victim, under the direction of a police officer. In all other states and territories, the reference sample is taken by the attending medical practitioner.
- 7. In January 2016, the then QPS South Brisbane Forensic Manager (FM), Acting Inspector Peter Bushell consulted with Dr Gary Hall, Acting Director of Queensland's Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit, Dr Cathie Allen, Managing Scientist Police Services Stream Queensland Forensic Health Scientific Services (QHFSS) and Ms Majcen, Sexual Assault Team Leader Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital. All parties were in agreeance that it would be in the victims' best interest to have all invasive procedures conducted during the one process.
- 8. In November 2016, Senior Sergeant Bushell and Acting Sergeant Tresise of South Brisbane District Forensic Services (QPS) consulted the substantive Director of Queensland's Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit, Dr Adam Griffin and Dr Cathie Allen of Queensland Health and during this discussions doctors Griffin and Allen declined to change the process stating various concerns. These included it was not best practice, inability of rural doctors to take a reference sample and that it would create contamination issues.
- 9. In 2017, Acting Inspector Taylor, QPS DNA Management Unit consulted Dr Cathie Allen who again declined to adopt the Guidelines.
- 10. In 2018, Inspector Neville, QPS DNA Management Unit contacted Dr Griffin who declined to adopt the 2014 Guidelines where the reference sample of the victim should be taken as part of the forensic medical examination.
- 11. On 26 October 2020, a Forensic Services Liaison Group meeting attended by Acting Assistant Commissioner Connors, Operational Support Command; Superintendent McNab, Forensic Services Group, Executive Director Dr Doherty, QHFSS and Director of Public Prosecutions, Mr McCarthy, agreed that the taking of the victim reference sample was the treating clinicians' responsibility, in turn reducing trauma and improving analysis efficiency.
- 12. On 14 December 2020, correspondence was sent to the Executive Director, Forensic and Scientific Services, QHFSS advising of the agreement between agencies, that the taking of the reference sample was the clinician's responsibility to prevent further trauma to the victim.

Continuation of Executive Briefing Note

SUBJECT: NON-COMPLIANCE OF 2014 QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT INTERAGENCY GUIDELINES - RESPONSE TO PEOPLE WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED SEXUAL ASSAULT

- 13. The attending parties of Forensic Services Liaison Group meeting held on 27 January 2021, agreed that the process of the taking of the victim reference sample was to transition to the responsibility of Queensland Health clinical staff with a proposed transition date of 1 July 2021.
- 14. This date has since passed without the endorsement of the Director of Queensland Health Forensic Medicine Unit, Dr Griffin.
- 15. On 27 October 2021, Detective Inspector David Briese and Ms Debbie Jones representing CIC and the QPS presented to the QH Forensic Nurses and Medical practitioners on the role of the Sexual Violence Liaison Officers and the Sexual Violence Prevention Strategy. Dr Adam Griffin was in attendance at this conference affording Inspector Briese to raise issues around The Guideline and taking of reference samples. At the time of this conversation, Dr Griffin provided several reasons as to his belief as to why this process did not occur in Queensland, including:
 - That he believes there may be an issue with cross contamination from saliva and semen in the victim's mouth that would prevent a buckle swab from being taken at the time of the SAIK;
 - ii. That even though another person's saliva only takes 8-10hrs to disappear from a DNA sense inside a victim's mouth, he does not want to have different processes for his staff of taking DNA depending on whether they may have mouth DNA contamination he wants one process for uniformity:
 - iii. He stated that with the current process of police obtaining the sample a few days later, it means that there is zero chance of contamination by that stage and thus this is his preferred process;
 - iv. He is also concerned about the possible contamination of samples if placed into the same SAIK kit for analysis;
 - v. He does not believe that a re-attendance to the victim by police and obtaining of the buckle swab would increase or add to the trauma being experienced by a sexual assault victim.
- 16. On 17 November 2021, Acting Executive Director, Ms Lara Keller of QHFSS was consulted regarding the expiry of the proposed transitional date. Ms Keller agreed with the guidelines, that it would be in the best interest of the victim and for national consistency to have the sample taken by medical personnel as part of the forensic medical examination.

ISSUES:

17. The current process exposes the victim is to an unnecessary secondary procedure involving police after they have undergone a forensic medical examination.

- 18. This creates more psychological trauma for the victim, which is actively mitigated by all other jurisdictions by taking the reference sample during the forensic medical examination.
- 19. The testing of the SAIK is conducted by Queensland Health which involves DNA analysis. Such analysis cannot be undertaken until a DNA reference sample is available. The involvement of police in the sampling process as a third party also causes unnecessary delays in the testing. The timely testing of the SAIK becomes pertinent where offences are random, are connected to a series of offences and offender/s are not known to the victim.
- 20. There are no legal impediments to the victim reference sample being taken by trained medical personnel. There are no provisions within the *Police Powers Responsibilities Act 2001* that specify that police must take victim reference samples. Victim consent can be obtained from the medical officer performing the forensic medical examination.
- 21. Dr Griffin has raised numerous potential contamination risks in his repeated objection to complying with the Guideline. All of these risks can be removed through appropriate collection and packaging processes which have been adopted in other jurisdictions.
- 22. On 7 December 2021, the first meeting of the SAIK Working Group was held. Representation from both the QPS and QH (FSS) attended the meeting to discuss the Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines and non-compliance with a view to discuss a victim centric approach, the agenda items including the responsibility of collecting reference samples, SAIK and reference sample procedures, Packaging of SAIK reference samples and Management of the exhibit.
- 23. The working group chaired by Superintendent Frieberg, QPS Forensic Services Group (FSG) was attended by the Acting Executive Director of QH(FSS), Ms Lara Keller, QH Scientists and practitioners in addition to experts within the QPS FSG (Biometrics) and QPS members within the Crime and Intelligence Command (Child Abuse and Sexual Crime Group). Apologies at the first meeting included Dr Adam Griffin from QH. The agenda for this first meeting was distributed for items, however it was only QPS who contributed to the agenda, of which written minutes were taken (Copy attached).
- 24. On distribution of the minutes, there appeared to be some contention as to the accuracy on what was or was not agreed to. As a result, it was decided that any future working group meetings would be digitally recorded. Further, a decision was made to include the feedback from all parties in the minutes.
- 25. The SAIK Working Group met for the second occasion on Wednesday 15 December 2021 with the meeting electronically recorded (A copy of the transcript is attached).

Dr Griffin who was in attendance at this meeting was unreserved in his views to the point of conflict which caused for the Chair to conclude the meeting early and a verbal briefing being provided to the AC's of OSC and CIC. Dr Griffin at this meeting repeated a number of his concerns but also added:

- i. That the 2014 policy, which he stated he was a co-author on, included a typographical error in respect to the obtaining of the mouth swab at the same time as the sexual assault examination:
- ii. That he believed it would be difficult and labour intensive to train medical practitioners in the taking of the mouth swab;
- iii. That unless actual complaints had been made by victims of sexual assault in respect to the mouth swab being obtained days later by police, he did not see a reason as to why the existing process should change;
- iv. That he suspected this was a "cost shifting" exercise on behalf of the QPS.
- 26. ED Lara Keller following the meeting reached out to Superintendent Frieberg and Inspector Neville and as a result, the parties met on Friday 17 December 2021. Ms Keller indicated in this meeting that she is on board with the QPS and wished to work through issues raised with a view to work toward a suitable solution. It was agreed that a smaller working group would continue (practitioner involvement) and a meeting was set for January 2022.
- 27. The Guideline is to be reviewed in the near future. Advice received indicates DPP prosecutor Mr Todd Fuller and Dr Adam Griffin will be involved in the future review of the Guideline.

RECOMMENDATION:

- 28. It is recommended an Executive member of the QPS is involved in any working group/committee that is to review the 2014 Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines for Responding to People who have Experience Sexual Assault, given the current representation and subsequent recommendations of the Women's Safety and Justice Taskforce.
- 29. It is recommended that all responsible agencies have a victim centric approach to victims to ensure adherence to the Guidelines is adopted by all interagency representatives when obtaining reference DNA samples for analysis of sexual assault investigation kits.
- 30. It is recommended the content of this briefing note is read and noted.

EXECUTIVE BRIEFING NOTE

SUBJECT: POTENTIAL ISSUES WITH TESTING OF DNA BY QUEENSLAND HEALTH FORENSIC AND SCIENTIFIC SERVICES

PURPOSE:

 To inform the Commissioner of potential issues reported in the media relating to the testing of DNA samples by Queensland Health Forensic and Scientific Services.

BACKGROUND:

- 2. Queensland Health Forensic and Scientific Services (QHFSS) undertakes DNA testing on behalf of the Queensland Police Service (QPS). Since November 2021 QHFSS has received continuous criticism in *The Australian* newspaper about the DNA testing it performed as part of the investigation into the murder of . The scope of the criticism has now widened to the threshold value used by QHFSS to determine if testing of a sample should continue.
- 3. In February 2018 QHFSS made a recommendation to QPS that testing of samples containing less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA should discontinue because the chance of obtaining a profile would be less than 2%. QHFSS advised that QPS could request testing to continue if the sample was critical to a case. Except for 'Priority One' samples, the QPS agreed to discontinue testing at that point as a matter of routine based on the advice.
- 4. Prior to this threshold being established, it was routine for samples with low amounts of DNA to undergo a process of concentration to improve the likelihood of attaining a profile. It is understood that the removal of this process as a matter of routine resulted in a significant cost saving for QHFSS.
- 5. On 14 November 2018 Inspector David Neville raised concern with Ms Cathie Allen, Managing Scientist, QHFSS that the triage process may be problematic after 3 out of 4 below threshold samples from a murder investigation yielded a result after QPS requested testing to continue. At that time QHFSS provided reassurance that the success rate would be lower than 2% and that the matter should be treated as an aberration.
- 6. On 26 November 2021 police investigating the murder of about 33 samples that were initially reported as having 'insufficient DNA for further testing'. When QHFSS was requested to continue with testing, 10 of them yielding a full profile.
- 7. Based on the results of the case, the DNA Management Section undertook a wider review of results achieved when the QPS requested testing to continue during the period of July to December 2021. This revealed 51 out of 160 samples provided a profile when the QPS requested testing to continue. This equates to a 30% success for samples that did not meet testing threshold.
- 8. As a result of the internal review, on 13 December 2021 Inspector Neville requested an explanation from Ms Allen as to why police were observing a 30% success rate for samples that were initially reported as 'insufficient DNA for further testing'. A request was also made for the threshold value to be reviewed to ensure it remained valid.

Continuation of Executive Briefing Note

SUBJECT: POTENTIAL ISSUES WITH TESTING OF DNA BY QUEENSLAND HEALTH FORENSIC AND SCIENTIFIC SERVICES

9. On 17 February 2022 The Australian published another article relating to the case claiming that thresholds used by QHFSS to triage testing are too high. It claims that the Queensland lab requires crime scene samples to have the equivalent of at least 22 cells to be fully tested, otherwise they are deemed to have insufficient DNA. It claims that the threshold is double the 11 cells required in NSW, and almost three times the eight cells that the product manufacturer has used to obtain good quality DNA profiles. It alleges there is potentially a very large number of cases where offenders aren't being identified when they should be.

ISSUES:

- 10. Over the past 12-month period approximately 4500 samples were reported by QHFSS as having 'insufficient DNA for further testing'. This would include samples from both volume and major crime matters. The results of the internal review indicate a significant number of these (up to 30%) may have produced a profile if the samples were concentrated and testing continued.
- 11. QHFSS indicated that it has moved the portion of the budget previously used to fund the sample concentration process to another area of the business. As a result, it may seek additional funding from the QPS if the process is reimplemented as a matter of routine.
- 12. The truncation of testing of low concentration samples will also have saved significant processing and interpretation time within the laboratory. A lowering of the threshold for testing to continue will mostly likely increase testing turnaround times.
- 13. QHFSS is yet to address the concerns raised by Inspector Neville other than indicating they will respond in due course. These concerns were raised prior to this issue around thresholds being raised in the media.
- 14. A review of the sample triage processes undertaken at QHFSS is recommended to ensure the thresholds for further testing remain valid. A letter under the hand of Commissioner requesting such review is attached for consideration of signing.

RECOMMENDATION/S:

- 15. That the content of the briefing note be noted.
- 16. That the Commissioner sign the attached letter requesting an interdepartmental review of the sample triage processes implemented for DNA testing.



As discussed, I am in agreement that:

- There is clear data that it is not an efficient use of time and resources to continue with the 'auto-microcon' process for Priority 2 (Major Crime') samples.
- Option 2. "Cease the 'auto-microcon' process for Priority 2 casework...." Would appear to be a more productive & efficient choice.
- Scientists time and resources would be better spent working samples with a higher DNA yield and more potential.
- It would be beneficial to amend the Forensic Register to provide an automated Q-Prime update advising the Investigators of the option to request further 'Auto-microcon' processing for those samples for unsolved crime, which may prove worthwhile.
- DNA staff can request this additional processing if/when a request is received from the investigators.

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

- Queensland Health Forensic and Scientific Services (QHFSS) undertakes DNA analysis of samples collected at scenes of crime by members of the Queensland Police Service (QPS).
- Numerous samples were collected and submitted for DNA testing however DNA evidence did not play a major role in this case.

- It is not unusual for samples taken surfaces to yield no DNA, particularly when there is no visible material present. When there is a visible stain, sometimes the properties of the substrate material can inhibit a meaningful DNA profile from being produced.
- QHFSS holds NATA accreditation which requires an independent assessment of technical competency every three years. It must meet rigorous international standards to maintain such accreditation.
- QHFSS has provided and continues to deliver high quality DNA testing services to the QPS.



Thank you for making us aware of the meeting between Magistrate O'CONNELL and Investigators this Wednesday, as we were not aware of this. Is it possible for our case scientist Rhys Parry to be a part of this meeting (if its via MS Teams)? Given it may assist in resolving/dismissing recent media concerns surrounding the DNA results produced by our laboratory.

The casefile was provided under subpoena in January 2017, however additional items have been submitted and testing since it was provided. We are working on including the additional pages to the scanned copy of the casefile, so that a complete copy of the file is provided. Given we won't be able to provide the additional information by the meeting on Wednesday, we endeavour to provide what we currently have.

The quantitation process used in 2013 did not provide information such as degradation so this information is not available. Additionally, gathering this data would be labour intensive for us to extract this information, if it were available. This data is gathered manually when it has been requested.

More broadly, however, the purpose of the paper was to provide some insight for crime scene examiners about the likelihood of generating a useable profile from a particular sample type based on the substrate and collection technique and thereby inform their decision-making at the point of collection. The study was never designed to evaluate the efficacy of the testing laboratory and it would be inappropriate to use the data for that purpose. Any attempt to do so would be significantly flawed. There are numerous caveats around these data and the appropriateness or otherwise of comparing these with previous studies, many of which are discussed in the paper. Hi Matt,

I did some further analysis from the data in your paper. Rather than doing the comparison on full profiles or single profiles, which may not include information gained from mixtures from the more sensitive PP21 kit as you have suggested, I did the comparison on 'no DNA' profiles. I used the same papers for the comparison, but some of the categories either dropped out or new ones were included depending on how sure I could be of the results (see attached), so it won't be the same as your Table 4.

Does this look right to you? There appears to be a large difference between the proportion of 'no DNA' from Qld compared to all other studies. There aren't any categories where Qld are getting better results, and Qld appear to be using the more sensitive kit, which you would think would decrease the 'no DNA' results.

Thank you for your response and clarifying the sexual assault samples. I understand your comments about not using the data to make comment about the lab's efficiency, and will respect your position on that. There are some very interesting results in there that may indicate there are issues in the lab though. The breast, oral and penis swabs are essentially clinical samples (taken from either the victim or offender by a GMO). To get such high amounts of 'no DNA' from those swabs is a concern (eg 52% of penis swabs getting no DNA, when you would expect to always at least get the donor).

There is an exemption to provide information under the RTI Act when it relates to an open criminal investigation. I understand that FSS provided a copy of the casefile under an RTI request in October 2016. I am unsure if advice was sought from QPS at that time, however I would hope that that we would have advised to seek exemption under that provision.

Dear Dr Wakefield

As you are aware, Queensland Health Forensic and Scientific Services (QHFSS) undertakes DNA testing on behalf of the Queensland Police Service (QPS).

In February 2018 QHFSS made a recommendation to QPS that testing of samples containing less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA should discontinue because the chance of obtaining a profile would be less than 2%. QHFSS advised that they would report samples below this threshold as 'insufficient DNA for further testing' and that QPS could request testing to continue if the sample was critical to a case. Except for 'Priority One' samples, the QPS agreed to discontinue testing at that point as a matter of routine based on the advice.

In December 2021 the QPS undertook a review of the success rate of obtaining a profile when it requested testing to continue for samples initially reported as 'insufficient DNA for further testing'. This revealed that 30% of the samples yielded a useable DNA profile when testing was continued.

I understand that the sample triage process may have resulted in considerable cost and time savings, however the relatively high success rates observed when testing is continued raises concerns in relation to the threshold value used. If the value is too high, it has the potential to result in offenders going undetected.

I have been keeping abreast of commentary in *The Australian* relating to DNA testing undertaken by QHFSS. On 17 February 2022 this widened to claims that thresholds used by QHFSS to triage testing are too high. It stated that the Queensland lab requires crime scene samples to have the equivalent of at least

22 cells to be fully tested, otherwise they are deemed to have insufficient DNA. It claimed that the threshold is double the 11 cells required in NSW, and almost three times the eight cells that the product manufacturer has used to obtain good quality DNA profiles.

I am not able to assess the basis or legitimacy of the claims made by *The Australian*, however they come at a time where similar concerns have been raised internally within my organisation.

Considering the current circumstances, I request that a review of the current DNA sample triage process be undertaken as a matter of urgency to ensure that the threshold value is still valid. Such a review should include benchmarking practices with other DNA laboratories within Australia.


I would request that an interdepartmental working party be established to undertake the review and offer the QPS to take a lead role. Should independent advice be required during the review, I would recommend this would occur by way of mutual agreement between both agencies.

We have undertaken a body of work here to try and work out what is occurring at QHFSS to result in samples not producing a profile that perhaps should have. In the homicide investigation 33 samples were reported as having "DNA Insufficient for further testing" (DIFFT). Ten of these went on to actually produce a profile when further work was requested.

In February 2018 QHFSS made a recommendation to QPS that testing of samples that contained less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA should discontinue because the chance of obtaining a profile was less that 2%. Samples below this threshold were previously micro concentrated in an effort to attain a profile. Based on the advice from QHFSS, the QPS agreed to discontinue testing including micro concentration under such circumstances and the result would be reported as DIFFT.

In November 2018 the QPS raised concern with QHFSS that the number of samples with less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA that might provide a result if testing was continued appeared to be much higher that 2%. The concern came about as a result of a murder investigation where three of four samples that were initially reported as DIFFT yielded a profile when testing was continued upon the request of the QPS. At this stage QHFSS reaffirmed that the data continued to show that the likelihood of getting a result for samples with less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA was less than 2%. The QPS accepted this case as an anomaly. At this time QHFSS also indicated they would have to increase the cost of testing if QPS wished to reintroduce micro concentration as a matter of routine because the savings achieved by removing this had already been invested in anther area of their business.

The recent case prompted a wider review of all samples that were retested after a DIFFT result was received over 6 months. This revealed 51 out of 160 samples provided a profile when the QPS requested testing to continue. This indicates that approximately 30% of samples provide a result if QPS requests testing to continue. Some of the samples that are reported as DIFFT which went on to produce a profile include:



WET GLANS PENIS (Swab) LOW VAGINAL (Swab) VAGINAL (Swab) CERVICAL (Swab)

Each of the above samples would be expected to contain high numbers of cells. The QHFSS scientist would have expected a profile to be generated and should have continued on with testing without having to be prompted by QPS.

It would seem that the process of discontinuing testing when samples contain less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA is unique to QHFSS. I would also appear that it was introduced as an efficiency and potential cost saving exercise.

I think it may be timely to review this arrangement. I wondered if you might be in agreement.

To ensure that we're all on the same page, I'd like to clarify the process. If samples that have been deemed 'insufficient DNA for further processing' are processed further, they all first undergo a concentration step, followed by amplification. This is in contrast with samples that are not deemed in this range, as these samples amplification, without a concentration step. Just wanted to draw to your attention that there is additional work undertaken on the DNA extract to attempt to achieve a DNA result for the samples deemed 'insufficient DNA for further processing'.

In addition to the items on the list provided previously, last week we requested a blood swab to be retested which was originally reported as "insufficient DNA for further testing". This sample was taken from blood on a broken shard of glass as depicted in the photo below.

Given the nature of the stain and inert substrate, we were surprised with the original result which is what prompted the request to further test. Today we were advised that subsequent testing yielded a single source 20 loci profile. This was an excellent result solving the crime which would have been otherwise missed.

The image below is attached to the exhibit screen which was visible to the laboratory staff. The results of presumptive testing are also included on that screen. I wondered if lab staff use this information when making a decision on stopping testing?



Since sending you my last message I found some correspondence from February 2018 where QHFSS made a recommendation to QPS that testing of samples that contained less than 0.008ng/uL of DNA should discontinue because the chance of obtaining a profile was less than 2%. Samples below this threshold were previously micro concentrated in an effort to attain a profile. Based on the advice from QHFSS, the QPS agreed to discontinue testing including micro concentration under such circumstances and the result would be reported as "DNA Insufficient for further testing" (DIFFT). I am assuming this is the information I was seeking in the below request.



On 14 November 2018 I raised similar concern in relation to after 3 out of 4 samples yielded a result when QPS requested testing to continue. At that time QHFSS provided reassurance that the success rate would be lower than 2% and that the matter should be treated as an aberration. As a result the QPS agreed to continue the truncation of testing for items below the threshold quantity of DNA and limit automated micro concentration to P1 samples only.

Given the result of the recent cases where continued testing was successful, might it be timely to review the practice of truncating testing of lower quant items? For instance, is the threshold value still valid? Also, with the implementation of the latest version of STRMix that can deconvolute more complex mixtures, is it more likely to get a result now?

I think the 30% success rate of retesting warrants a little further examination to make sure we are maximising our chances of solving crime, particularly for major crime matters.

I look forward to discussing this further with you.

Thanks for the additional information on those samples from that particular case. We'll have a look into them and get back to you when we can.

After we had conducted a review of a large dataset, it was found that below a particular quantitation threshold and in line with manufacturer's specifications, a very small percentage of samples may provide some type of DNA profile, if they proceeded through DNA processing. This information was provided to the QPS, and the QPS advised that it would prefer that those samples that didn't exceed the quant threshold were not processed through to a DNA profile. We've monitored this and have found that with a larger dataset, the small percentage didn't vary.

We'll provide advice for this particular case when we're able to.





Good morning colleagues,

The Child Abuse and Sexual Crime Group (CASCG) continues ongoing discussions with the Department of Health regarding the provision of forensic examinations of sexual assault victims by Hospital and Health Services. As recently as this week, Det Supt Mark White, Debbie Jones and Bridgette Allen from the Policy and Programs Unit and I met with the Senior Forensic Physician and Director at Queensland Health Dr Adam Griffen and Forensic and Scientific Services Assistant Director of Nursing Jacqui Thomsen.

All matters of concern provided by your areas have been provided to the Department of Health and they have stated they will provide advice back as to why those issues occurred, and are committed to getting this process right.

While I believe that as a result of this continued communication we will see improvement, I also am under no illusion that we will continue to see problems in respect to refusals to conduct sexual assault examinations on both adult and child victims and/or directions to transport our victims to other hospitals.

CASCG is committed to assisting Qld Health get this process right – to ensure that our victims are treated in a timely and dignified manner, and to assist our investigators to obtain the evidence required. In this respect, I ask that you continue to provide any instances that we can provide formal representation of to our colleagues at Qld Health.

Furthermore, could you please ensure your investigators are aware that Forensic Physicians (GMO's) are on call 24/7 for the entire state and Qld Health have assured us that these Doctors will do everything to assist you on ground when you run into a difficult situation. They will provide information and advice to the medical staff you are dealing with and attempt to ensure they conduct the examinations as required. This also has the added bonus of it being recorded and accountable to Qld Health in real time. Should an investigator wish to make contact with the on-call forensic physician they only need to make contact with Police Communications who will then provide access to the on-call number.

Welcome back to FSG! This one might be a little easier to discuss in its entirety to see which way you may like to proceed.

• MOU (2014) were agreed guidelines between government agencies for a best practice framework for people who have experienced sexual assault;

- As part of this agreement it was determined by the government agencies/working group that one
 aspect was the reference sample should be taken <u>routinely</u> as part of the forensic medical
 examination:
- Qld is the only Australian jurisdiction where the victim takes their own reference sample;
- Dr Griffin is the only person who is against this proposal and against the proposed change albeit being jointly signed by the then Director General of Health;
- The taking of the reference sample by medical personnel ensures that the victim is only subject to the one invasive procedure;
- A significant advantage of the reference sample taken by Health is that everything is encompassed
 by them including supporting parties eg. Sexual Assault Teams who currently do not discuss the
 reference sample as it is not their charter (the SAIK only is discussed by Health staff and <u>not</u> the
 reference sample);
- The QPS have addressed all disclinations presented by Dr Griffin including contamination, "country doctors could stuff it up," and police do a better job in the reference sample collection (although the victim does it);
- Dr John Doherty, AC OSC and CoP are also all in agreeance with the taking of the sample by medical
 personnel is best practice for the victim and aligns with the intention of the MOU.

I am hopeful of a resolution but I wouldn't be overly shocked that the process will remain the same unless instruction came from the Honourable Minister D'Ath or Director General of QHealth Mr Wakefield.

For consideration – if you have time in your diary for 30 minutes I'll liaise with Jenna to organise a time.

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



This MBN has been reviewed and supported by Superintendent Frieberg. Forwarded for favourable consideration and progression.

Dot points below are additional information for AAC French and AC Innes. Should there be no traction with Acting Executive Director Keller, Queensland Health, it is requested the below dot points are forwarded to DC Linford due to her role in the Women's Safety Committee.

Additional information:

- If this reference sample is taken by medical personnel. The process of the taking of the SAIK and reference sample is discussed by support services. Currently, counsellors do not discuss the taking of the reference sample as it is not their charter;
- The OPM's were changed by A/Insp Ewen Taylor as a result of Dr Griffin declining to change process. Section 2.6.3 advises that the reference sample is to be taken at the same time of the SAIK. This was to ensure that the reference sample was in fact taken by investigators. Good in theory but difficult in practice as investigators are building a rapport with victims and sometimes this is not practical;
- 50% of kits (2016) arrived at QHFSS without the reference sample. Generally two fold. Firstly, junior
 detectives already thought that it had been taken as part of the SAIK and secondly detectives were
 walking the SAIK through without the reference sample not knowing that analysis could not
 commence without it:
- Insp Neville advises that once a SAIK is received that detectives are also advised to ensure the reference sample is taken. This reduces the timeliness of the analysis of the kits. If detectives have not taken the references sample and the SAIK arrives at QHFSS for analysis then realistically this has the potential to put the analysis of the kit back in excess of a week due to the fact that sometimes it is not operationally possible to take the kit immediately to QHFSS.

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MINISTERIAL BRIEFING NOTE / APPROVAL

SUBJECT: BREACH OF 2014 QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT INTERAGENCY GUIDELINES –
RESPONSE TO PEOPLE WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED SEXUAL ASSULT

PURPOSE:

1. To inform the Minister of the non-compliance of Queensland Health to implement interagency best practice guidelines by not taking DNA victim reference samples at the time of the forensic medical examination.

BACKGROUND:

- 2. In June 2014 a Government Interagency Working Group published the policy document Response to Sexual Assault Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines for Responding to People who have Experienced Sexual Assault (The Guideline). The purpose of the Guideline was to prevent unnecessary trauma being caused to victims including during subsequent forensic medical examinations. It recommends that victim DNA reference samples, usually a mouth swab (on occasion a blood sample) should be taken routinely as part of the forensic medical examination.
- 3. Currently in Queensland, the practice used is contrary to the guidelines, and victims are subject to a forensic medical examination conducted by trained doctors and nurses, where samples are collected using a Sexual Assault Investigation Kit (SAIK). This is followed by a later procedure where a DNA reference sample is taken at the direction of a police officer. In essence the victim is subjected to two separate forensic procedures.
- 4. The collection of DNA by police can increase stress for the victims at a time they are most vulnerable due to fear of how the information may be used by authorities. Queensland is the only Australian jurisdiction where police are involved in the collection of reference samples. In all other jurisdictions the reference sample is taken as part of the forensic medical examination as recommended in the Guideline. This ensures that the victim is subject to only one invasive procedure, thereby minimising trauma.
- 5. Since the Guideline was published, the QPS has been liaising with Queensland Health to have the process altered so that it consistent with national best practice and aligns with the standing guidelines. All requests to implement change have been declined by Dr Adam Griffin who manages the forensic medical program within Queensland Health.
- 6. In January 2016, Acting Inspector Bushell, South Brisbane Forensic Manager (QPS) consulted with Dr Gary Hall, Acting Director of Queensland's Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit, Dr Cathie Allen, Managing Scientist Police Services Stream Queensland Forensic Health Scientific Services (QHFSS) and Ms Majcen, Sexual Assault Team Leader Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital. All parties were in agree ace that it would be in the victims' best interest to have all invasive procedures conducted during the one process.
- 7. Enquiries were conducted with all Australian jurisdictions which identified that Queensland was the only jurisdiction where the reference sample was taken by the victim, under the direction of a police officer. In all other states and territories, the reference sample is taken as part of the SAIK.
- 8. In November 2016, Senior Sergeant Bushell and Acting Sergeant Tresise of South Brisbane District Forensic Services (QPS) consulted the substantive Director of Queensland's Clinical Forensic Medicine Unit, Dr Adam Griffin and Dr Cathie Allen of Queensland Health and during this discussions doctors Griffin and Allen declined to change the process stating various concerns. These included it was not best practice, inability of rural doctors to take a reference sample and it would create contamination issues.
- 9. In 2017, Inspector Neville, QPS DNA Management Unit contacted Dr Griffin who declined to adopt the 2014 Guidelines where the reference sample of the victim should be taken as part of the forensic medical examination.

- 10. In 2018, Acting Inspector Taylor, QPS DNA Management Unit consulted Dr Adam Griffin who again declined to adopt the Guidelines.
- 11. On 26 October 2020, a Forensic Services Liaison Group meeting attended by Acting Assistant Commissioner Connors, Operational Support Command; Superintendent McNab, Forensic Services Group, Executive Director Dr Doherty, QHFSS and Director of Public Prosecutions, Mr McCarthy, agreed that the taking of the victim reference sample was the treating clinicians' responsibility, in turn reducing trauma and improving analysis efficiency.
- 12. On 14 December 2020, correspondence was sent to the Executive Director, Forensic and Scientific Services, QHFSS advising of the agreement between agencies, that the taking of the reference sample was the clinician's responsibility to prevent further trauma to the victim.
- 13. The attending parties of Forensic Services Liaison Group meeting held on 27 January 2021, agreed that the process of the taking of the victim reference sample was to transition to the responsibility of Queensland Health clinical staff with a proposed transition date of 1 July, 2021.
- 14. This date has since passed without the endorsement of the Director of Queensland Health Forensic Medicine Unit, Dr Griffin.
- 15. On 17 November 2020, Acting Executive Director, Ms Lara Keller of QHFSS was consulted regarding the expiry of the proposed transitional date. Ms Keller agreed with the guidelines, that it would be in the best interest of the victim and for national consistency to have the sample taken by medical personnel as part of the forensic medical examination.

ISSUES:

- 16. The current process exposes the victim is to an unnecessary secondary procedure involving police after they have undergone a forensic medical examination.
- 17. This creates more psychological trauma for the victim, which is actively mitigated by all other jurisdictions by taking the reference sample during the forensic medical examination.
- 18. The testing of the SAIK is conducted by Queensland Health which involves DNA analysis. Such analysis cannot be undertaken until a DNA reference sample is available. The involvement of police in the sampling process as a third party also causes unnecessary delays in the testing. The timely testing of the SAIK becomes pertinent where offences are random, are connected to a series of offences and offender/s are not known to the victim.
- 19. There are no legal impediments to the victim reference sample being taken by trained medical personnel. There are no provisions within the *Police Powers Responsibilities Act 2001* that specify that police must take victim reference samples. Victim consent can be obtained from the medical officer performing the forensic medical examination.
- 20. Dr Griffin has raised numerous potential contamination risks in his repeated objection to complying with the Guideline. All of these risks can be removed through appropriate collection and packaging processes which have been adopted in other jurisdictions.

RECOMMENDATION/S:

- 21. That the Minister:
 - a. To progress the issues at the Ministerial level to ensure that Queensland processes are consistent with all other Australian jurisdictions in line with the Response to Queensland Government Interagency Guidelines for Responding to People who have Experienced Sexual Assault. This will ensure enhanced psychological welfare of victims, efficiency in obtaining reference DNA samples and analysis of sexual assault investigation kits.

Rape victims forced to wait hours in Queensland hospitals

Rape victims have been kept waiting in Queensland hospital emergency departments for almost 24 hours unable to take a shower, change clothes or brush their teeth because there are no trained staff available to collect vital DNA evidence.

A coalition of senior police, health staff and social workers has sounded the alarm on how the system "frequently fails" victims in regional Queensland as part of an independent inquiry into women's safety.

Sexual assault victims – including children – have been turned away from regional hospitals - because there are no medical staff available to conduct forensic medical exams, also known as rape kits, while larger hospitals have kept patients waiting for almost 24 hours.

The inquiry, headed by former appeal court president Margaret McMurdo, will report to the Palaszczuk government this month about domestic violence recommendations, including whether to criminalise coercive control.

A second report into women's experiences in justice system, including a review of the state's sex consent laws, has been delayed until June 2022 because of a huge number of submissions.

In one submission to the inquiry, Senior Sergeant Edward Kinbacher, who heads the Cairns criminal investigation branch, said forensic examination services across the state were "generally poor and not fit for purpose" but the degree of dysfunction varied around Queensland.

The 34-year veteran detective said arrangements between the state government's health, justice and police departments "fail frequently to adequately meet the psychological, medical/forensic and generally humanitarian needs of complainants and victims of sexual assault".

Sergeant Kinbacher gave recent examples of failures including a child rape victim who was told no forensic exam was possible for 36 hours because there were no on-call staff available.

"After high-level complaints at Cairns Base Hospital, the examination was conducted in a shorter timeframe," he wrote in his capacity as a Sexual Assault Forensic Integrated Response Network member.

Sergeant Kinbacher said another victim left the emergency department without being examined, after waiting almost 24 hours. "This victim was later located by police and the examination conducted," he wrote.

A third victim was turned away from a regional hospital because no staff was qualified to conduct the exam. She then drove herself to a larger hospital where the rape kit was conducted. Sergeant Kinbacher said those failures happened when there were gaps in the on-call roster — the longest being four days — with no contingency plan from Queensland Health.

Lack of qualified staff available to conduct rape kits was exposed by the state's auditor-general in 2019, who found survivors had to drive for hours to find a clinician trained to collect evidence.

The auditor-general decided to dig into rape kit availability "because the Queensland Police Service raised concerns about longstanding difficulties for sexual assault victims accessing these examinations".

In response to the report, the Palaszczuk government promised to train more nurses to conduct rape kits and since then, more than 60 nurses and midwives have been trained through the Central Queensland University.

Attorney-General Shannon Fentiman said women were often retraumatised while trying to seek justice, and the inquiry was looking at better supporting victims as they made their way through the system.

6. Inquiries with interstate revealed all Police jurisdictions in Australia, with the exception of Queensland, take a victim DNA reference sample at the time the SAIK or equivalent is administered by their authorized Forensic Medical examiner – see appendix A for contact liaison list.



7. Inquiries with respective Brisbane Region Detective, Officers' in Charge, reveal a change to current police procedures would be embraced, as changing this procedure should not only reduce potential further distress / anguish to the victim, but also save investigative time of detectives by eliminating a potentially unnecessary follow-up visit.

All,

From what I recall this wasn't actually mentioned. It was my understanding that QHFSS did not want to utilise blood collection for each SAIK but in the instances where oral assault occurred and due to the low percentage of this occurring (2% or 8 per year) that QHFSS processes could accommodate blood analysis for those cases since it was low – I believed that this was stated by Ms Cathie Allen. Am I mistaken here? From what I recall, there was no conversation of a later buccal swab in those instances.

SAIK and Reference Sample procedures explanation to victim.

DF – I guess Dave can just join us when he is available, so thank you everyone, again for joining us to discuss further the SAIK kits and how we are going to look to do business moving forward. First of all, I know that there was probably a little bit of contention over the minutes from the last meeting so I have made the decision just to leave the comments as they are, as they came in, obviously different people have different recollections about what was said or not said, so I will go around the room and if anyone wants to make any comment about that then we'll certainly make note of it and if there is any clarification we need to go through then we'll do that but, I have just made the executive decision that in order to make sure the minutes are correct moving forward that we will record them electronically and we will provide you with a copy of those, or I can provide them to Lara to distribute.

LK - thank you

DF - So if everyone is happy with that

LK - thank you yeh

DF - So apologies from our end, from Duncan McCarthy and we've been able to have Nicole Townsend join us on this occasion, it was good that she could make it, she couldn't make the last

meeting. I think Sgt Fabian COLLESS, he's online, that's great. So I guess Lara, do you want us to to go through each of those items for discussion from the last meeting or do we just want to have a general discussion about those?

LK – So I guess from our perspective, you know we did have some amendments to the minutes, but I do note that they were added on, so they kind of read as differing views on the same topic in some areas. I do note though that you had said that we would discuss at the next meeting and for each agency to put forward their position and I also note on the agenda for today that there is the opportunity to document that so, you know, I guess, moving forward, this is probably our preferred approach, to document each sides position and minute that.

DF — Ok. So we may as well just start with the first which is the 2.1. I don't think that there was anything really contentious in that agenda item from the last occasion, so, are we all in agreeance with that actually staying the same as it reads? (All agreed) Yep. Ok, 2.2 the responsibility for collecting reference samples so just a discussion I suppose on the completion, obviously something like this will be a work in progress and I know that there are some differing views about whose responsibility that is. I guess again from the last meeting the conversation around doing what's right I guess for the victim in the circumstances so we can alleviate some of the trauma for them moving forward. Does anyone want to make any comment about that? (Pause) Nope, ok. The SAIK and reference-

LK - Sorry, Adam has got his hand up

DF - Oh.

AG – Sorry about that. I was just trying to work out where the complaint came from?

DF — There's no complaint, it's been something that we've identified from the Queensland Police Service around the need for, in accordance with the guidelines, that are currently in place, just to make sure that we are victim centric and that we try and you know for their purposes, not have

Police, you know, 7 days later, knock on the door to take a reference sample. So, there wasn't any particular complaint, but I might let Peter talk.

PB – No, there wasn't a complaint Doctor. I think what realistically what we want to do is honour the guidelines from our perspective. In relation to taking the reference sample as part of the forensic medical examination and in that way we can condense two procedures into the one, and also it alleviates the fact that Police have to explain the process of the reference sample, and whilst QH staff explain the process of the SAIK so we can combine the two explanations together so to reduce the exposure for the victim.

AG – Ok. So, it's not a complaint and there has been no victim issues but this reference sampling which you do which is routine across the state and several hundred times a week is now a traumatic experience?

PB – Like I said Doctor, we just wanted to conform with respect to the guidelines, those guidelines were-

AG — So the guidelines are actually in error. I mean, it's not actually a requirement to be done and certainly there is no pathway so if we were to look at it from a global perspective the training and delivery of DNA reference sampling is standard Police procedure for anything including and beyond sexual assault. So this is an addition to a pathway that currently isn't in existence and in essence the backup of it seems to be that there is a concern that Police are traumatizing people. So I can't actually see it, we don't have a measurable there, we haven't got a viewpoint problem where it is an issue because otherwise you are still collecting a reference sampling across the board for various victims for various crimes then you are traumatizing them, I don't see that —

PB — I don't think we are necessarily traumatizing them, what we're doing is we're trying to reduce the fact that victims are not exposed to two actual processes that it would be a better way moving forward in conjunction with other states, now last week we were all in agreeance that that would rest with the forensic nurses or medical practitioners —

AG – Apologies, I wasn't at the meeting and I wasn't necessarily aware that that had been agreement. The actual basis of reference sampling as a standard, I am not particularly interested in what other states are doing, I am probably interested in just doing it properly. And are we comparing other geographically challenged states or are we just comparing states that are centrally located and centrally managed.

PB - I think both

DN - yeh

AG – So WA obviously there is a mixture isn't there?

PB - There is, yes.

AG – yeh, and so the really the part that we're talking about here is the development of something new that Police are concerned that they maybe traumatising a patient.

DN — Isn't just returning to the pathway that we used to have, my understanding was that prior to sometime in the 2000's it was a process and we've changed it now to police taking it, and yes Police do take DNA from people as a matter of course, our preference wouldn't be to take DNA from victims and to limit that. Obviously from offenders, yes we do for obvious reasons because we're exercising a police power but when you're a victim of a sexual assault and all of a sudden you have authorities taking your DNA from you as well it comes a lot more stressed with police taking dna from you then medicos because there is concern on how police will use that. And we don't exercise any powers to take it at that time. So, it is victim centric making sure that the person who potentially is very traumatized because sexual assault is unlike other offences and to make sure that it is done in a way that minimises any additional stress on the victim, so that's all we're seeking.

AG – Yep, so we have come up with some communication strategies if that's an issue but primarily you talk that it was a historic issue and its historic now and Police were actually analysing reference samples and it was separately packaged and sent with the older documentation, so you've got that was certainly a clear issue. I guess we've got to look at it from a practical perspective here too. We have people who are currently trained who are quite effectively performing the work and there has been no issue or complaint directly from it but more that there is a perceived issue. The perceived issue comes with a management issue to train and change pathways and add to kits which all add up to a very large expense both immediately and ongoing. I think with all honesty I think this has to be fleshed out as a much more policy document before we actually even start talking about it in this way and what I don't have in front of me is a policy document, what I have in front of me is an agenda and it actually looks more like a cost shifting agenda at the moment then it does a service centric agenda so you would probably be best if we looked at this more broadly as a significant policy change and we can reflect on those various issues and (inaudible) and consult out as well to support groups that are providing support to victims. If the expense there has to be shifted across from QPS to health then the way that that expense will come across is not going to be very friendly to QPS and you can appreciate the time and training it takes to train a clinician is significantly more expensive because you're already doing it within QPS, you're already training because you're already going to have to collect (inaudible) and so in essence it's quite a large expense that we're doing it and I don't necessarily think there is going to be a path forward by discussing this as a concept alone when there is actually quite a few layers to what is involved. At the moment we are close to training approximately 200 or more people we would have to bring back to retrain to explain the process of reference sampling and that's an expensive process and its one where we got to try and achieve 100% across the board. If we're going to look at what was going to work for the laboratory processes as well I will very much let Cathie speak to these but again we're going to need a discrete process I would suggest to ensure that there is no risk to contaminating or ruining the sample. And I think that that would really the victim centric approach is actually making sure that there is the one procedure that they go through is uninterrupted and unlikely to lead to an error so it has to be a discrete process. So there is a few issues here. I don't see this as a straight forward thing as it's being expressed at all, because we have an existing body of examiners which are already trained in the collection of DNA. Yeh, sorry, Dave has his hand up.

DN – So back to your point about your policy the reason we're at this point is that there is a policy and I don't agree it is in error. It's pretty clear in the policy that there is a recommendation that the sample be taken by the medical examiner at the time of the examination and it is for that reason we

try and limit the trauma to the victim. We're not trying to shift costs back to QLD Health (QH) in fact the testing, we're in agreement that we would continue to pay for the person testing and we've even gone to the extent that whatever the consumables are, we're happy to provide those to QH for the preparation of the kits, and in terms of the training of medical experts, the collection of the reference sample is not a difficult process, it's quite straight forward and I don't envisage you would need to bring staff to have face to face training to provide that. And in terms of the potential contamination of it there is a much higher risk contaminating the crime scene samples taken from the intimate areas then there is of the reference sample and you will know straight away from the reference sample if it is contaminated because there will be more than one profile and as far as the buccal swab potentially contaminating all of the samples, the crime scene samples, everyone of those sample I would expect to have the victims DNA in it anyway because of where they were taken from, so that is how perspective on it. So, yeh. And just the policy that was referred to was something that was signed by all the parties in 2014 or something so —

AG - Yeh, so, co-author of them, I am fully aware of the (inaudible) -

DB – So, Adam if you're the co-author of them, and I've just joined in but I, Dave Neville probably put it the best way and in a lot better way then I was about to because I got to be honest, when you say this thing is just a cost shifting exercise I am quite offended by that because it certainly isn't, it's trying to get you guys, as in health, to do what you signed back in 2014 and like you're supposed to be doing, to make sure that we're being victim centric here. So if you're saying that you're the coauthor, why hasn't that been done, why isn't it being done and why are there so many blockers as you've just outlined to you doing it, because mate, policies there-

AG - But (inaudible)

DB – Hang on, hang on, woah, woah, Policies there, we're taking on a number of the costs already, and the training is minimal if required. We're talking about doctors and experienced nurses who examine all parts of the body but you're saying that there's going to be this massive training required for everyone because they have to stick a buccal swab in a victims mouth at the same time as they're undergoing other examinations. None of that adds up to me, I'm not a doctor, I don't pretend to be,

but to me its not a shift, not a cost shifting exercise from our side it's a duty shifting exercise on your side. So back to my original question is, why is it that back in 2014 you co-authored this document but it hasn't been done?

AG—yes, it is a typographical area, so it should say "not" because there was no actual capacity within the kit to do so. And that was the reason for it being there. So not sure when it changed from "not" but obviously it got overlooked as it went through and that's why it actually hasn't been in place or wasn't in place then. The only time it was in place was back in the very old kits and that had the separate document and things were actually going through to the Police DNA laboratory for analysis, which is of course, some decades ago. Though the actual capacity capability of the kit wasn't there so whilst it's based that we do want to actually create and make sure its there. I agree there is capability of people to collect reference samples but no, to suggest it doesn't have to be training is naïve. The actual packaging is separate utility of it and also when you can't collect it and if you are going to collect it and use FTA paperwork which I understand is the preferred process well that's the difference (inaudible) it is quite discrete so it's possible... it's naïve to think that no training is to be required.

DB-No, I'm not saying no training is be required-

AG-Yeh

DB-l'm not saying no training will be required because if coppers can learn in one day then medical practitioners who do this for a living can learn within an hour or two l would imagine.

AG — we are not going to get everybody together in one day (inaudible) Jacqui, sorry, you got your hand up?

JT — Sorry, I understand that the policy document, the guideline that we're referring to was created in 2014 and we're some 6 years down the track, I'm imagining (inaudible) not sure what the review for such a document, do we know what the time frame is for a review?

AG – Thanks Jacqui, yeh it is actually currently under review. We have about 12 months because we're pending the integration of the paediatric component from the Royal Commission. That's actually the main stay of what's stopping a review going forward. I have not heard from where that is, but that seems to be the main stop so it's going to be a uniform document that basically adult and paediatric response.

CH – If the FTA sampling is part of what's causing the hesitation that's just our agreement to work in with the lab preference because it's my understanding the buccal cells are the labs preference for a reference sample. Whereas, as you're aware it used to be blood tube but the FTA card for the buccal cells was just, so long as we get a victim reference sample we don't mind how that's done, the FTA cards which is what we were discussing here was just us working in with the lab preference. So, if you're saying for your doctors and nurses that it would be easier to take a blood sample and that would not require all the testing that you're suggesting then perhaps the blood is the way to go. But obviously that causes a problem at the lab.

AG – No, why would do we want to go stick needles in people if we're not sticking needles in them so that's possibly more of a point. No, I just think at the moment we're looking, like, I would like some more flesh before we're actually informing our policy and process and to spend money on this sort of thing and we need to actually look at how it's being done and make sure that it's an appropriate expenditure of funds and efforts. At this stage this is not emergent and as far as I can see we're not responding to a particular issue we're not changing the police training who will continue to understand how to collect DNA. We're looking at implementing a different process across kits both historic and before they actually go out now and a look at the training behind it. A substantial effort is actually going to be required from a small group of clinicians to train the larger body. I do have some hesitation in seeing it and really looking at how its supposed to be a harm, but so at the moment if we're looking at the policy document saying that this is the argument the policy document doesn't reflect the practice unfortunately and it's an unfortunate typographical error and if it's the basis for the policy-

DN - (inaudible) from our perspective -

DB – How about reflect the policy? How about reflect it and actually see its go nothing to do with you're saying its going to be so much more work for you, its more work for us too, yeh it reduces the time that we have to go three days later and do this but we need to put kits together, we need to assist with that, we've been working on it for some time now as a working party to come up with the best way to do this for us and for health but you know what. This isn't about health and it's not about the cost, its about the victim and what it seems to me is that for yourself Adam its about Health, its not about the victim, the victim comes second and you know I could say with all due respect that's how it seems to me. We are trying to make it better and more victim centric, you are creating barriers as to why we can't.

AG – That's not necessarily the case at all. Because what we have, you've described something as a notion, you've described something as (inaudible) –

DB — It's not a notion mate, it's done in every other state bar QLD and possibly one other. It's not a notion. It's something that you signed off on and is done in other areas.

AG – We've discussed that already. What we're actually looking to is the impetus for changing a process that has yet not received any complaints or concerns, that the police engagement is traumatic. It is something that is obviously something that must occur in other situations when you're collecting DNA from individuals (inaudible)

DF - I really don't -

DB – we take DNA off (inaudible)

DF – Dave, I really don't think, we're not getting anywhere having this discussion but I guess the things is that at the end of the day, there is a very big spotlight on sexual assaults, domestic violence and so on and so forth in relation to females and victims at this particular time, so I'm just thinking it look, I really don't think at this particular time we're moving forward at all I'm mindful we've all got members who are involved in the Women's Safety and Justice Taskforce. I think that this will become

something that will be - Something that the light, the spotlight will be shone on at some particular stage in relation to the sexual assault of victims and the taking of DNA. So if we need to go back and we need to have further discussions in our own agencies about the position I am happy to raise it up to my AC and Deputy and maybe the discussions should be happening at a higher level.

AG - Agree

PB — I completely agree. I cannot see how that would not be best practice moving forward into the future, in line with other states, in line with the guideline itself, I am at a loss. I completely agree with the Supt it can get addressed up our Commissioner has a very invested interest in it, along with her Deputies and Assistant Commissioners. So I agree with the Supt, we should raise that up.

NT – I don't think something needs to be complaint driven to show that it's traumatic either. I'm miffed about that, you know, the victims wouldn't have a process of making a complaint about the process anyway, I think its just a given that being dealt with twice is going to be more traumatic, I think anyone can see that.

DF – Alright, well look, I think, look we'll certainly take on board what you've said Doctor and we'll share that around, I really don't think we're progressing any further, obviously you've got a certain view in relation to this and I think there needs to be certain consultation perhaps from our level, at a higher level, so I'll take what you've said on board and I will raise it up to my AC and maybe they can have some conversations with Lara (Lara Keller) in the first instance and we can go from there.

ALL - All Agreed

DF – the time is 11:31 and we'll cease the meeting there. Hi Dale and Ewen

I just wanted to provide you with an update regarding the issue with the Promega PP21 kits that we and two other jurisdictions are experiencing.

We have tried three different lot numbers of the PP21 kit and the issue is still present. We have tried a Promega Fusion kit (this kit includes the 2 loci that we are experiencing issues with) and this kit also showed that the issue is present (presumably due to using the same primers in both PP21 and Fusion).

We've conducted an experiment, as requested by the American Manufacturer, however this showed the issue was still present, but assisted them with more information.

Today we will be conducting four experiments to provide the American Manufacturer with more information. Included in these experiments is a different instrument (to rule out instrumentation, although we believe it's unlikely that the instrument is the issue, testing will be conducted to rule it out) and a kit from a different manufacturer that includes the 2 problematic loci.

We have compiled all of the data that we've gathering from the different experiments that have been conducted and have not been able to detect a trend (ie it's not sample dependent, its not position on a run dependent etc).

We will continue working with the manufacturer on this issue. And we will continue to process urgent samples that are requested by the QPS or are required for Statements and Court matters.

The laboratory hasn't experienced an issue like this previously and we have liaised with our counterparts in other jurisdictions regarding this issue. I apologise for the impact that this has on the QPS and the community. We have allocated a large number of resources to this issue to resolve it as quickly as possible.



Good afternoon,

Please find below dot points with regards to the Promega PP21 kit issue.

Background. Pre-February 2018, Queensland Health used **PP21 kits** for Major crime (*Improved/more sensitive kits*), and **Profiler Plus** for Volume crime. Post Feb-2018, FSS consumed the last supplies of Profiler Plus throughout the world, and have adopted PP21 for all crime.

- 13th April, Forensic Scientific Services (FSS) identified an issue with the current lot of PowerPlex 21 (PP21)

 DNA kits
- The issues means 2 loci (Out of the 20 loci) are not amplifying properly.
- Additional lots of current PP21 kits have been received from the American manufacturer, however the problem remains.
- FSS are working the issue in conjunction with the American Manufacturer.
- FSS have liaised with fellow Australian jurisdictions and established that those using PP21 are experiencing the same problems.
- The issue effects approximately 60% of samples.
- The only Australian jurisdictions unaffected are those using Globalfiler.
- The Inspector DNA Management Section (DMS) has negotiated a temporary work flow with FSS, where single source profiles for volume crime are being processed with temporary results released for intel.
- The temporary work flow cannot be used for 2 -3 person mix profiles, due to the complexity.

- FSS are treating the issue as their highest priority are addressing the most likely causes first (Experimenting with clean up kits, instruments, equipment, water, extraction processes etc).
- FSS are unable to provide any type of time frame as to when the issue will be resolved.

Risks.

- DNA Samples potentially linking serial offenders may be delayed until the issue is resolved.
- High Priority (Homicide) analysis may be delayed if sample extract is too low to risk re-amplification, until
 matter resolved. (Risk of consuming all of the DNA sample for a process which may not work)

Solutions.

- The Inspector DMS is working closely with FSS to identify and prioritise high priority cases.
- Inspector DMS negotiating with FSS RE samples which present a risk of consuming the extract through additional re-works.





We have tried three different lot numbers of the PP21 kit and the issue is still present. We have tried a Promega Fusion kit (this kit includes the 2 loci that we are experiencing issues with) and this kit also showed that the issue is present (presumably due to using the same primers in both PP21 and Fusion).

We've conducted an experiment, as requested by the American Manufacturer, however this showed the issue was still present, but assisted them with more information.

Today we will be conducting four experiments to provide the American Manufacturer with more information. Included in these experiments is a different instrument (to rule out instrumentation, although we believe it's unlikely that the instrument is the issue, testing will be conducted to rule it out) and a kit from a different manufacturer that includes the 2 problematic loci.

We have compiled all of the data that we've gathering from the different experiments that have been conducted and have not been able to detect a trend (ie it's not sample dependent, its not position on a run dependent etc).

I just wanted to provide you with an update regarding the issue with the Promega PP21 kits that we and two other jurisdictions are experiencing.

We have tried three different lot numbers of the PP21 kit and the issue is still present. We have tried a Promega Fusion kit (this kit includes the 2 loci that we are experiencing issues with) and this kit also showed that the issue is present (presumably due to using the same primers in both PP21 and Fusion).

We've conducted an experiment, as requested by the American Manufacturer, however this showed the issue was still present, but assisted them with more information.

Today we will be conducting four experiments to provide the American Manufacturer with more information. Included in these experiments is a different instrument (to rule out instrumentation, although we believe it's unlikely that the instrument is the issue, testing will be conducted to rule it out) and a kit from a different manufacturer that includes the 2 problematic loci.

We have compiled all of the data that we've gathering from the different experiments that have been conducted and have not been able to detect a trend (ie it's not sample dependent, its not position on a run dependent etc).

We will continue working with the manufacturer on this issue. And we will continue to process urgent samples that are requested by the QPS or are required for Statements and Court matters.

The laboratory hasn't experienced an issue like this previously and we have liaised with our counterparts in other jurisdictions regarding this issue. I apologise for the impact that this has on the QPS and the community. We have allocated a large number of resources to this issue to resolve it as quickly as possible.

Hi Dave

Yes, the loci that are affected by the suppression are in both Profiler Plus kits and PP21 kits. We're unable to use Profiler Plus as the manufacturer discontinued that kit and the last of the kits were consumed by the lab in January of this year. We purchased a GlobalFiler kit (similar kit to PP21 but made by a different manufacturer) and the affected loci were suppressed with that kit as well. This is what led us to concentrate on the extraction process for our investigation.

As the lab is now using STRmix for statistical interpretation of all profiles, excluding loci has an impact on STRmix's ability to model the profile and provide statistics. So excluding them is not a course of action that we're able to take.

We have set up a sub-team that are tasked with assessing the amount of suppression within a particular profile within the context of a case. If the suppression greatly affects the ability to interpret a profile, then re-extracting the sample is the best option (depending on other samples in the case, as a number of factors are considered prior to re-extracting). If the suppression within a particular profile doesn't affect the interpretation, then profile can be reported to the QPS. Not every profile is affected by the suppression, and not all profiles are adversely affected by the suppression. A bottleneck in our processing began when the issue was highlighted, due to an uncertainty regarding the root cause. We're now attempting to remove that bottleneck.

Hi Dale and David

I wanted to provide you with a final update regarding the suppression of 2 loci in the PP21 kit that we've been experiencing. We've continued to work on the root cause of the suppression and have worked closely with the manufacturer from the beginning regarding this issue. Earlier this week, the manufacturer provided us with further information regarding the root cause.

Upon notification from us of this issue, the manufacturer's Research and Development team began some investigations. Another laboratory (that isn't using PP21) also contacted them and advised them of some issues that they were seeing, that are similar to us. The R&D team have advised that there appears to be an issue with one component of the extraction kit that we use. They advised that this issue appears to have occurred mid manufacture of a lot number – meaning that our trend analysis on lot numbers wouldn't have highlighted this issue.

The R&D team have provided a modified extraction protocol to us to test and the outcome of the test showed that the samples are unaffected by the suppression issue. We have advised the company of this outcome, meaning the modified protocol resolves the component issue. We have requested that the issue be resolved within the kit, rather than being resolved by modification of the protocol, as any modification of the protocol will require validation (which uses resources and time). The manufacturer will soon issue a notice regarding a timeframe for the resolution of the issue.

We will continue to process samples using a different method (as described below), that is of the same quality standard and is unaffected by this issue. We will continue to report samples as quickly as possible and have scheduled an overtime session for processing results this Saturday, 30th of June.



Dear Supt,

As discussed this morning. It has come to my attention that FSSQHS frequently report results of a DNA link to a person and then later retract the result. On almost every occasion the initial reported result is a component of a 3 person mixture. They report very high probabilities (greater than 100,000,000,000:1) that a person contributed their DNA to the mixture and this information is reported to investigators through QPRIME. On some occasions the result is later reviewed and the initial result is retracted and instead they report that the sample yielded a mixed profile that cannot be interpreted.

I have included some recent examples of this occurring in the table below. I happens quite frequently (I am told it occurs more than twice a month).

These results are not reported as preliminary or accompanied by any type of caveat. They are acted upon by investigators and could result in a person being charged and possibly kept in custody.

I have asked that FSSQHS for more information regarding this frequent occurrence. I have requested to know why it occurs and what quality controls the result go through before release. I have also asked if police should treat results involving mixtures with caution.

The reporting of results from 3 person mixtures only commenced when FSSQHS introduced a statistical program called STRMix which allows them to separate components from a mixed profile. The practitioner has to manually determine how many persons are in the mixture and the program then isolates each contributor based partly on the concentrations of the material present and other factors. If the examiner makes a bad call on the number of contributors, STRMix can give an unreliable result. This may be the reason for the recall of the result.

I will provide further information when FSSQHS respond to my request for information.

It may be that we need to treat any result from a mixed profile with a higher degree of caution.
